IHL SPAGHETTI DINNER GUEST SPEAKER Saturday, September 10, 2022

Our distinguished guest speaker for our annual Spaghetti Dinner will be Chad T. Sarchio who served as the 50th president of the D.C. Bar from July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022. He was the third Italian-American lawyer to serve in that post since the D.C. Bar was established in 1972, and only the second government lawyer to do so.


Chad is a native of New Jersey and during elementary and high school, he was a member of the Boy Scouts and rose to the highest rank of Eagle Scout. After graduating from high school, he received a scholarship from the National Italian-American Foundation (NIAF) and entered the Public Policy Program at Duke University in North Carolina. He also received a U.S. Army Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC) scholarship. After earning his undergraduate degree and receiving his commission as a second lieutenant, he went to law school at George Washington University in Washington, D.C.

After obtaining his law degree, he served on active duty in the Judge Advocate General (JAG) Corps for four years and stayed in the U.S. Army Reserves for 20 more years. His first assignment was at Fort Bragg, N.C., working in legal assistance and claims positions. Then, in the Fall of 1997, he began a six-month deployment to Bosnia and Herzegovina as a senior foreign claims commissioner. He completed his active service as military counsel to the Army's Auditor General. During his service, he married another lawyer, the former Christina Guerola, with whom he has two children.

After leaving active duty, he served as a federal prosecutor in the U.S. Attorney's Office in D.C. for more than six years, prosecuting a wide range of violent and white-collar crimes. In the Fall of 2005, he worked on a Senate Select Committee investigation into the response to Hurricane Katrina, which had hit the Gulf Coast. As a reservist, he later taught at the U.S. Army JAG Corps School. In the Spring of 2016, he became a military judge. He retired from the U.S. Army and its trial bench as a lieutenant colonel in 2019.

He has worked as an associate chief counsel for the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) since 2006, and has lectured in trial and appellate advocacy at George Washington University for more than 20 years. During his spare time, he repairs and maintains classic cars.

I was able to secure most of our in-person space at the Sydenstricker U.M. Church. I am SOOO grateful they agreed to take just about all our classes. It is truly not easy to move from one location to another when I have to set up Zoom and clean up after each class!! Although I was grateful, it was hard to readjust to all of it this past school year. Nevertheless, I am still VERY, VERY appreciative for this new online opportunity we have come to learn and to embrace as part of our new way of living.

Our classes are based on a COMMUNICATIVE approach to the Language. As grammar is definitely taught in our classes, speaking and understanding of the spoken and written language is our 1st and main goal. Classes are composed of 2 hours of instructions and a 10-minute break every 55-60 minutes.

Beginner classes: Will use the "**New Italian Espresso 1**" **book for English speakers**. This book set includes Textbook, workbook, audio visual DVD/CD <u>which will be used for about 2 Years</u>. This is generally different for <u>each class</u>. It takes 5 to 7 sessions to finish this beginner course based on the speed of the class. Teacher will purchase the books for the class. The cost for this 2-year packet is generally \$95.00 to \$105.00 based on shipping.

Beginner Reading Classes: Will use Alma Edizioni level reading books as soon as their grammar book is completed.

Our **Pre-intermediate** students will use <u>Viaggio in Italia</u>, for which the teacher will provide the recording. The book which is not available in the USA in paper format is now available for free online.

Intermediate: Will use the "**New Italian Espresso 2**" **book for English speakers**. This book set includes Textbook, workbook, audio visual DVD/CD <u>which will be used for about 2 Years</u>. This is generally different for <u>each class</u>. It takes 5 to 7 sessions to finish this beginner course based on the speed of the class. Teacher will purchase the books for the class. The cost for this 2-year packet is generally \$95.00 to \$105.00 based on shipping.

Intermediate/Advanced: Will use the **Farinelli Guided Film Series.** We will start with: <u>*Giorni e Nuvole*</u> This book will be used for 1 session. Teacher will purchase the books for the class so that we can get a shipping discount. Teacher will send the recorded section to watch in class each week prior to class.

Advanced: Will use the ALMA NUOVO ESPRESSO L5 (C1) with Audio CD and online video access. This book will be used for 4-5 sessions based on the speed of the class. Books can be easily found online on Amazon.

THE FIG TREE

If you are Italian or Italian American, you most likely have a "fig tree" story in your family background. For me, although I did not know my great-grandparents, I am relying solely on words, images and details from my momma. Her grandparents, Rosina and Crescenzo, owned a "mercato italiano" near Union Station in DC, but the "fig tree" was planted at their home close by. Momma recollects that the tree was so large you had to pick the figs from the upstairs bedroom window on one side and use a ladder outside to pick from the other side of the tree. In my youth, friends and neighbors of my paternal grandparents had fig trees and I remember even as a child loving the taste of fresh figs picked right off the tree, eaten before we could rinse them. For my birthday in late 2013 my daughter, Kerri, gave me my first tree, in a small black pot, the branches only a foot or so tall. Well, it was planted and got through its first winter and has thrived every season since. It seems I picked the perfect spot! With every passing year, I have my doubts if "my tree will return from the harsh winters, will it have fruit this year, how many will I be able to pick and eat?" This year in particular the grandchildren and I have been picking and enjoying these juicy, sweet, tender fruits all through late summer (some grandchildren don't even wait to rinse them or collect them in a bowl; I can only assume they must have inherited their Nonna's instincts and joy of picking this beautiful fruit right from nature and delightfully consuming it). Recently I needed to seek the knowledge of Laura and John Asiello when I noticed the figs were on a smaller size. They gave me expert advice in pruning at the right time of year to improve the growth of the fruit. I also decided that this variety produces a smaller fruit and I am no longer confused – the leaves are large, green and healthy, the tree has grown tall, wide and sturdy, the fruit is delicious and plentiful, all good signs – so I am just going to enjoy the chances I have to pick, rinse, and pop these bitesized beautiful figs into my mouth while the summer lingers a bit longer!
