A Few Reasons Why We Celebrate Columbus Day

Several states have renamed Columbus Day and memorials to Columbus are under attack by iconoclastic vandals. Commemorations are at an all-time low while public opinion polls show only a 56% favorable opinion of Christopher Columbus. Even though the holiday was instituted in 1934, the roots of this holiday are deeply ingrained in our American culture. Below are a few reasons why we can hold our heads high as celebrants of Christopher Columbus Day:

<u>Italian heritage:</u> Columbus Day is still a celebration of triumph for America's Italian-descendant population. Joseph Sciorra, an Italian American studies professor at Queens College in New York said: "There's an emotional bond to Columbus. I've read poetry which has – says, you know, when I look at the figure of Columbus on a statue, I don't see Columbus. I see my grandfather. I see the sort of worker's hands in his hands. I see the visage, his visage. And I see that of my grandfather. So there's a really emotional bond there."

<u>Flawed heroes:</u> Americans once revered men of uncommon tenacity such as Christopher Columbus as "flawed heroes." According to Catholic historian Warren H. Carroll, "Columbus was a flawed hero – as all men are flawed, including heroes – and his flaws are of a kind particularly offensive to today's culture…But heroes and the inspiration they give are essential to uplift men and women…. Heroes need not be perfect; indeed, given the fallen nature of man, none can be perfect. It is right to criticize their failings, but wrong to deny their greatness and the inspiration they can give."

<u>Greatest achievements:</u> Historical figures should be honored by their great achievements, their vision, and not their mistakes or weaknesses. Columbus was a great man with an adventurous spirit, sailing the seas to prepare to establish a new world. He was a brilliant man in his own right, a master navigator and admiral. Columbus' resourcefulness in using very rudimentary ocean navigation methods and information to find a reliable route to North America (even though he was intending on finding Asia) is still worthy of admiration.

Italian American Heritage Month

Italian American Heritage Month is celebrated every year to honor and recognize the centuries of achievements, successes, and valuable contributions of Italian immigrants and Italian Americans. It occurs in October to overlap with the federal holiday of Columbus Day, which is celebrated on the second Monday of each October. Italian American Heritage Month was first celebrated in 1989 by a special proclamation of both Congress and President George H. W. Bush.

Over 5 million Italians immigrated to the United States between 1820 and 2000. Currently, there are over 26 million Americans of Italian descent residing in the United States. This makes Italian-Americans the fifth largest ethnic group in our nation. Each year Italians around the country take time to celebrate their heritage, history, and culture with festivals and parades. The largest parade occurs on Columbus Day in New York City and has over 35,000 marchers!

Joe Scafetta wrote these heartfelt remembrances of two OSDIA members who sadly lost their lives in the September 11 attacks on our country. If you did not have the chance to read these words before, I am reprinting for the Newsletter. cs

"September 11 is a tough day for me too. In August 2001, I attended the National Convention in Florida and met again Peter B. Gay Jr. who I had first met at the 1993 National Convention when I went as the newly elected state president of Virginia. Peter was a Massachusetts delegate and he gave me and other delegates a fancy pen holder which I took home and placed on my office desk. It has a brass plate on it and it is inscribed with his name on it and the dates of that national convention in August 2001. About three weeks later, he was a passenger on the first plane which crashed into the World Trade Center. Peter was 52. In August 2005, I went to the centennial national convention in New York City and I visited Ground Zero with my wife Teresa and our 7-year old son, Joey III. Later that day, I met Peter B. Gay Sr., a former national president, and I told him that we had seen his son's name on the list of casualties at Ground Zero. I then asked him if he had visited the site. He replied: ''No, it will be too hard for me to go there.'' Peter Senior died not too long afterwards. He was 95."

"Saturday, September 8, 2001. I was working the food booth for the George Washington Lodge at the Italian Festival in Market Square in Old Town Alexandria. I and my wife Teresa were members of the GW Lodge at that time. Towards the end of the day, one of the GW members, John Sammartino, came to the booth with his wife and 7-year old daughter. His parents were emigrants from Pescara which is a large city in Abruzzo on the Adriatic sea coast. My father was an emigrant from Vasto which was another Adriatic sea coast city in Abruzzo, so John and I had a friendly relationship. After I served John and his family, I asked him if he was planning to come to the next lodge meeting on Sunday, September 16. He said that he had to fly to Los Angeles on Tuesday but he expected to be back by Friday, September 14. I then asked him if he was going for pleasure with his wife and daughter. He replied: "No, the trip is strictly for business for my employer." John was on the plane which crashed into the Pentagon on Tuesday, September 11. John was 37. On September 11, 2001, the memorial park was dedicated at the Pentagon. I went there for a visit with my wife and son. In the following month of October, I went to the GW lodge meeting and I saw John's mother there. So, I went over to her and I told her that we had visited the memorial park. She replied that she and her husband Frank went to an earlier unveiling for families of the victims. She was always with her husband, so I asked her: "Where's Frank?" She replied more or less: "He died after our visit to the park but before the official opening on September 11." Mrs. Frank Sammartino died shortly thereafter."
